

Amnesty International Canada: Corporate accountability**Grade level: middle and secondary****Presented by: Margaret Flynn, Amnesty International Canada**

This workshop will talk about how we, as Canadians, can use our purchasing power responsibility in a way that does not unintentionally further human rights abuses around the world. It will focus on the international mining, oil and gas industries where human rights abuses are a particular concern. It will talk about actions teachers can encourage their students to take, including canvassing retailers as to where their product comes from, researching and buying products that are not associated with human rights abuses, ways to put pressure on the Canadian government to encourage corporate social responsibility, and ways to put pressure on offending industries themselves.

Canadian Physicians for Aid and Relief: Teaching global citizenship – examining issues of global poverty in the classroom**Grade level: secondary****Presented by: Kevin O’Neill, Program Coordinator, Canadian Physicians for Aid and Relief (CPAR)**

This workshop enables teachers to explore in-class strategies and resources on teaching global issues, and learn about the practical work that non-governmental organizations such as CPAR carry out on the ground in Africa to build healthy communities. We will explore successful approaches to addressing topics related to global poverty with meaning and sensitivity: touching upon the significance of global citizenship, the language of empowerment, the power of images, and effective ways of empowering youth to make a difference. The workshop will also provide an overview of Tools For Learning, CPAR's free and downloadable teaching resources that are tied directly to Ontario Curriculum expectations. This exciting workshop will provide teachers with the knowledge and tools necessary to foster the next generation of global citizens right in their classroom.

This workshop will increase awareness and involvement in improving the conditions of poverty and suffering that affects almost three billion people worldwide. This workshop will explain and link many of the causes of poverty and ongoing vulnerability, identify some long-term sustainable solutions that can break the cycle, as well as some of the obstacles, and help teachers understand how to be involved at a local level to make a difference internationally that will change these vicious cycles to more virtuous ones.
